

FROM OUR CEO

It can be hard to sum up a whole year of progress, accomplishments, and challenges into one letter and one report. But if I were to characterize HopeWell's impact over the past year, there are a few factors that have really anchored our work:

LEADING THE CHARGE

Making progress toward our mission requires us to address the types of systemic issues — including poverty and institutional racism — that often lead to youth and families coming into contact with our system in the first place. During FY23, we did more than ever before to lay the foundation for systemic change and lasting impact. From building a new data infrastructure to guide learning, to raising public awareness through media engagement strategies, to commissioning a statewide survey on foster care, to advocating for legislation on Beacon Hill — we are solidifying our role as a change agent.

SUPPORTING, EMPOWERING, & UPLIFTING EACH PERSON

At the same time, foster care and social services aren't experienced on a systems-level — they're experienced in people's daily lives and in their homes, schools, and communities. **The work we do is personal.** So despite how much things have changed in the nearly 60 years since HopeWell was founded, our driving force remains: ensuring that each child, individual, and family has the personalized supports and trusting relationships they need to heal and thrive.

CONNECTING PEOPLE & PRIORITIES

This year marked year one of our newest strategic plan. The priorities we chose — analysis capabilities, thought leadership, and workforce development — reflect our belief that lasting impact is created by addressing both collective societal issues and frontline needs.

WHAT WE DO

Supporting HopeWell makes a positive impact in the lives of children, individuals, and families in six main ways:

COMPREHENSIVE FOSTER CARE



We ensure children across Massachusetts have the safe, loving foster homes they need to grow and thrive.

In a state and a nation where *every* child is supposed to have a fair shot at success, we seek to lead the charge and deliver on this promise for one of the most systemically marginalized groups of young people — children and teens experiencing foster care.

We are the largest nonprofit provider of comprehensive foster care in Massachusetts. We recruit, train, and support loving foster homes — and we ensure that the children and teens in our care receive the stability they need and deserve.

FAMILY SUPPORT & STABILIZATION (FSS)



We intervene upstream by teaming up with families to stay together.

Families in crisis are often facing real-world stressors, such as poverty. But the right combination of supports when they need it most can help build bridges toward better days.

We provide intensive in-home supports to families involved with the Department of Children and Families (DCF) who are working to maintain or regain custody of their children. The goal is keep families intact through a combination of crisis intervention, family counseling, and referrals to community supports.

RISE



We advance education equity for children experiencing foster care.

Children in foster care face some of the largest educational opportunity gaps of any group of children in Massachusetts — and these disparities can have lifelong effects.

Our newest program provides children in grades K-3 who are experiencing foster care with the building blocks they need to become strong readers and writers. Children receive personalized, one-on-one literacy tutoring at their homes. Each session includes embedded opportunities to practice social-emotional skills. Caregivers receive support so they can advocate for their child and promote learning. RISE also coordinates services and information-sharing among schools, families, and the Department of Children and Families (DCF).

ADULT SERVICES



We work with adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities as they pursue independence, live with dignity, and engage as full members of their communities.

Adults living with intellectual and developmental disabilities share many of the same hopes and dreams as those who aren't — meaningful work, good friends, and a comfortable and secure home.

Our Shared Living Program matches individuals with members of the community, and these Shared Living Caregivers provide a stable environment, assist with daily routines, and receive support from HopeWell. We also partner with adults who live on their own to support their independence and capacity to provide loving care to their children, if they are parenting.

MY FIRST PLACE™



We support young people who are "aging out" of the foster care system as they launch into adulthood.

Young people often face uncertainty as they enter adulthood — and this is especially true for those doing it without the support of a permanent family.

To help them reach their full potential at a pivotal time in their lives, we provide young adults who are transitioning out of the foster care system with shared, rent-free apartments. With a stable place to call home and individualized supports from our team, youth focus on their education and employment goals, build community, and establish foundations for long-term self-sufficiency.

POLICY & ADVOCACY



We positively impact social policy and drive systemic change.

The individuals, children, and families we serve deserve the resources, supports, and opportunities they need to grow and thrive. Although our programs provide them with many of these directly, we also work to improve the underlying conditions needed for systemic change, such as budgets, policies, and legislative priorities.

We shape agendas and create alignment among leaders and community members, share data and analysis, and elevate the voices and insights of people directly impacted by the issues.

COMPREHENSIVE FOSTER CARE

We ensure children across Massachusetts have the safe, loving foster homes they need to grow and thrive.



A GROWING NEED

We're facing a hard truth in Massachusetts: not every child who goes through the trauma of being removed from their home will have a safe, loving foster home readily available. More foster parents are urgently needed.

This shortage has been building for decades across the state, and was further exacerbated by the pandemic. Even as the largest nonprofit provider of comprehensive foster care, we have experienced a 68 percent decrease in the number of licensed foster homes over the last 20 years.

As part of **National Foster Care Month** this May, we launched Foster Hope MA — a public media campaign to raise awareness about the critical need for loving foster homes and to find and support Massachusetts residents who may be interested in fostering. We spread the word through local news media coverage, radio spots, digital advertising strategies, outreach to our partners, and more!

PUTTING TOGETHER THE RIGHT INGREDIENTS FOR THE **NEXT STAGE OF PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT**

We are partnering with experts to:

- Refine our curriculum to best meet students' needs
- Develop high-quality tools for measurement and analysis so we can use data for continuous learning and improvement



Social-emotional skills are foundational to learning. Over a six-month period, students participating in RISE improved in key social-emotional competencies:

- ✓ Emotional recognition
- ✓ Social perspective taking
- ✓ Social problem solving
- ✓ Self-control

A caregiver shared that their child has been reading more and more since beginning RISE sessions — she now brings a book with her everywhere they go.

A tutor began driving a student home from school so he could attend tutoring sessions. The tutor and child began incorporating literacy into the commute, making sure they had literacy games like "I-Spy!" to play, or giant books to read in the backseat. One day, pausing halfway through his book, the child stopped and said:



I am getting so much better at reading!



A caregiver expressed that they felt more prepared to advocate for their child during an IEP meeting because of the support they received from RISE.

Another caregiver shared that RISE sessions have helped her daughter **gain confidence** to participate in classroom discussions.

MY FIRST PLACETM

A BRIGHT SPOT IN BRIGHTON

In FY23, we purchased a three-unit apartment building in Brighton that will enable us to support young people aging out of foster care for decades to come. This is the first of two homes we will purchase using a \$1.5 million grant from Liberty Mutual Foundation — the largest gift from a philanthropic partner in HopeWell's history!

BUILDING POSITIVE FUTURES

Each young person participating in My First PlaceTM works closely with a team of professionals from HopeWell to meet the personal goals that are most important to them.



- ✓ Saving money and working on credit health
- ✓ Maintaining full-time employment
- ✓ Continuing the process of getting a driver's license, including preparing for the permit test and taking driving lessons
- ✓ Pursuing studies in a variety of fields — from film production, to pre-med, to cosmetology
- ✓ Strengthening relationships

A PATH TO INDEPENDENCE

It's becoming harder for youth who are otherwise ready to exit the program to do so into stable housing because of the high (and increasing) cost of housing in Greater Boston. Despite this challenge, many youth successfully transitioned out of My First Place™ in FY23, including signing their own leases, maintaining stable employment, and engaging in school — while keeping some savings on hand.

FAMILY SUPPORT & STABILIZATION (FSS)

We intervene upstream by teaming up with families to stay together.

FAMILY PRESERVATION & REUNIFICATION

When a family is involved with the Department of Children and Families (DCF) due to possible abuse or neglect, we provide services to **alleviate the immediate crises** that brought them there in the first place, so that families can stay intact and fewer kids are placed into foster care.

HopeWell clinicians work side-by-side with families to navigate the effects of trauma, recognize strengths, practice effective parenting skills, engage in problem-solving, and make progress toward goals.

NEW HOMES & LIFELONG BONDS

In FY23, we saw an influx of people interested in **sharing their homes** and their lives by stepping up to become Shared Living Caregivers. We have been working diligently to hone our onboarding processes so that new caregivers are fully supported and ready to hit the ground running!

PROGRAM TRANSITIONS

We made the careful yet difficult decision to **transition our work in staffed community homes** over to another organization, Advocates, at the end of FY23. This decision was grounded in our commitment to providing the highest-quality care to the individuals we support, as well as our responsibility to ensure employees have the resources they need to continuously learn and grow in their careers.

EXAMPLES OF OUR IMPACT

- ✓ We collaborated among programs to place a young woman who was experiencing homelessness into a Shared Living placement and received a grant to assist with paying for her education at Roxbury Community College.
- ✓ We moved a couple into a Shared Living placement with a caregiver and obtained new, fresh furniture for them.
- ✓ We applied for a grant so that we could provide a washer and dryer for a mother with young children.

In FY23, we supported adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities through three main pathways:*

11 INDIVIDUALS

Living on their own, to support their independence and capacity to provide loving care to their children, if they are parenting

19 INDIVIDUALS & 14 CAREGIVERS

Via our Shared Living Program, which matches each individual with a member of the local community

POLICY & ADVOCACY

We positively impact social policy and drive systemic change.

NEW ADMINISTRATION, NEW LEGISLATIVE SESSION, NEW OPPORTUNITIES

January 2023 marked the start of a new legislative session, as well as a new Governor taking office for the first time in eight years. With this transition came new partners, new decisions, and new opportunities to improve the ways we support children, youth, and families across Massachusetts.

RELATIONSHIP-BUILDING

This year, we connected with dozens of state Representatives and Senators to discuss legislative efforts to support children and families experiencing foster care. We offered ourselves as a resource by:

- ✓ Highlighting effective programs and policies from across the nation that could be implemented locally.
- Creating fact sheets for legislators.
- Providing research on specific bills and initiatives of interest.

HopeWell staff attended State House Advocacy Day on Beacon Hill, hosted by our partners, The Children's League of Massachusetts.

CONVENING STAKEHOLDERS

In November 2022, we were invited to participate in a first-of-its-kind working group, organized by Mayor Wu's Equity and Inclusion Cabinet. The group is now co-chaired by Julie Segovia (HopeWell's VP of Research, Policy, & Learning), and meets regularly to address the unique needs of youth who are "aging out" of foster care.

INFLUENCING BILL LANGUAGE

At the request of the Joint Committee on Children, Families, and Persons with Disabilities, HopeWell staff and youth had the opportunity to review and reflect on the final draft of the *Bill of Rights for Youth Experiencing Foster Care*.

OUR FIRST-EVER LEGISLATIVE AGENDA

(S.114) An Act Providing for Universal Basic Income for Youth Aging Out of Foster Care

Beginning at age 23, provides a cash stipend of \$1,000 per month for five years to youth who "aged out" of foster care.

(H.182/S.102) An Act Relative to Bias-Free Child Removals

Removes identifying information (such as race, ethnicity, and socioeconomic status) from all relevant documents DCF uses to make decisions regarding removing children from their homes on an emergency basis.

(H.3570/S.244) An Act Fairly Reimbursing Local School Transportation of Foster Children

Requires state agencies to apply for reimbursement to cover the costs incurred by schools for transportation of children in foster care between their foster home and school of origin.

(H.157/S.65) An Act Protecting Benefits Owed to Foster Children

Ensures children in foster care receive benefits, such as Supplemental Security Income (SSI), if they're eligible.

(H.158/S.66) An Act Establishing the Massachusetts Foster Care Review Office

Establishes an independent office to conduct reviews for every child in a foster care placement, at least every six months.

(H.189/S.79) An Act to Establish a Massachusetts Children's Cabinet

Promotes interdepartmental collaboration and includes an advisory committee comprised of relevant community stakeholders.



My role is to ensure that the **Voices** and experiences of children, youth, and families directly involved in our child welfare system, and the expertise of our HopeWell staff who support them on a day-to-day basis, are brought to bear in conversations about child welfare policy here in Massachusetts.

We conducted a statewide survey to examine public awareness and perceptions of foster care.

DATA TALKS

As the largest nonprofit provider of comprehensive foster care in the state, HopeWell is leading the charge to address the pervasive shortage of foster parents. To better understand the root causes of this challenge, we commissioned a survey of Massachusetts residents on the topics of foster care and foster parenting.

What does the public know about foster care? What misconceptions are floating around out there? What are the barriers to people becoming foster parents?

SURVEY DETAILS:

- ✓ 1,000 MA residents, ages 25-64
- ✓ Demographics mirrored the state overall
- \checkmark Margin of error = 3.1%



KEY FINDING #1

There is a lack of widespread familiarity with foster care.



LESS THAN HALF of MA residents surveyed could identify the correct definition of foster care.

Misunderstandings about various aspects of foster care and foster parenting were prevalent.

KEY FINDING #2

For most people, the main barriers to fostering are a mix of logistical factors and a lack of information.*



SPACE AT HOME was the top obstacle overall.

Other top barriers that emerged:

- √ Lack of time
- ✓ Don't know how system works
- ✓ Too disruptive
- ✓ Don't want to deal with bureaucracy
- ✓ Too expensive
- and hassle
- ✓ Too old
- ✓ Heard negative things

Concerns about the children themselves were among the least likely factors to be seen as obstacles.

*Based on both quantitative data and open-ended questioning

KFY FINDING #3

Interest in fostering jumped by more than 60% once respondents were given more information.

During the survey, we provided some education about foster care and dispelled common misconceptions.



Afterward, among those who had never fostered before, MORE THAN 1 IN 3 said they would very or somewhat seriously consider fostering.

KFY FINDING #4

There is **strong consensus** around the importance of prioritizing improvements to programs and systems to help young people in foster care.



83% agree that it is an extremely or very high priority. (Just 1% said it was not much of a priority.)






HopeWell's FY23 operations resulted in a planned surplus of \$508,000, mostly from fundraising to support the organization's capacity-building efforts.
